Every year, on the Friday after Labor Day, Watkins Glen celebrates the Grand Prix Festival. For those of you who are unfamiliar with racing and Finger Lakes history, in 1948, Watkins Glens hosted the first post-World War II auto race in the USA. Cars raced on the local roads including running straight through the middle of town. The racing continued each year until following a fatal accident in the 1952 race, after which the race moved to a dedicated track and later to its current facility now called Watkins Glen International (WGI).

The weekend after Labor Day, WGI hosts a weekend of Sportscar Vintage Racing Association (SVRA) vintage car racing. On the Friday, many of these vintage race cars come down from



WGI en masse, lap the 6.6 mile "old course" (which still exists pretty much as it did in 1948) and park on Franklin St for the evening. Spectators line the streets to celebrate a tribute to the return of these vintage racers to the village of Watkins Glen. During the day, a number of "tours" are held for the auto enthusiasts where you drive your car along a prescribed course, have a group lunch, do laps of the old course, park in a group and generally have a good time. One of these is the "Sporting Roadster Tour". This is limited to sporting convertibles to which the Miata/MX5 certainly qualifies and a number of our

members participate every year.

Whether you come for the evening to watch the cars roar through town, see all the cool cars parked in town, spend the day on a tour, or attend the vintage races at WGI, it's a great time. I encourage you all to check it out! See GrandPrixFestival.com for full details.

NEW EXPLORATORIUM!

Come and enjoy a great ride in the Finger Lakes while searching for answers to clues. We will provide you with a list of clues to identify something specific and a map that shows where each item is, but not which clue is at which location. You plan your route, and each Miata MX-5 can go a different way. Most of the answers are on the main roads. A few are off the main road but visible from the main road. Some are easy to find, and some are less easy to find. None of the clues are difficult or tricky! A few items require you to walk as much as 100 feet to read letters on a sign. At some locations, you will be able to get the answer while sitting in your car. You can reach all clues via paved roads that are in good condition.

(TBD) You will drive in the area bounded by the Thruway to the north, but not driving on the Thruway, Canandaigua Lake to the east along its length, as far west as the village of Conesus, and as far south as Springwater. The entire drive should be about 80 miles. It is best with two people per car, and they work together. However, you can do it alone. Gas, restrooms, and food are available at many locations along the way, especially in the northern part of the drive.

First Aid Kits (FAKs) for your Miata

Spring brings thoughts of outdoor and driving adventures and preparing your Miata for a fun summer. Now is an excellent time to give thought to your first aid kit.

Disclaimer: The advice here is not definitive, nor a substitute for proper training, In all cases, training and medical professional guidance supersede the advice given here.

The most important component of a first aid kit is your knowledge and training. Buying a fancy FAK is only half the solution, and will prove inadequate if you are unfamiliar with or don't know how to use it. The Red Cross offers online and in-person. often hands-on, classes. One example is Adult First Aid/CPR/AED Skills. Another excellent example is Stop The Bleed. It's a grassroots national awareness campaign and call to action. Stop the Bleed encourages bystanders to become trained, equipped and empowered to help in a bleeding emergency before professional help arrives. See www.dhs.gov/stopthebleed for more information.

Some first aid kit contents expire. Take some time now to examine yours. Familiarize yourself with what's there by removing everything, looking it over, and putting it back into the kit. Read the accompanying instructions. Make sure you can get to the kit and everything in it quickly and easily. Consider you may be alone and possibly injured or bleeding. Now is the time for fun practice using some of the components.



Commonly available FAKs are often overstocked with low-cost items. It is not unusual to see several dozen adhesive bandages ("band-aids"), a First Aid pamphlet, and a few ointments or soon-to-expire over-the-counter meds. These may soothe your conscience and be easy on your pocketbook, but may not be as useful as you think should more serious situations arise.



Medical Gear Outfitters is a reliable supplier of first aid kits, contents, and related accessories. These range from a \$10 "Boo-Boo Kit" with adhesive bandages, ointments, and current over-the-counter medications, to full kits such as the \$50 FATPack 4x6 Small Kit, to more extensive kits such as the \$85 FATPack 7X10 Response Kit. Some components of the Response Kit, such as the CPR shield, occlusive dressing, and 6" Israeli (pressure) Bandage require training to use but would be useful for trained medical professionals who may happen to be at the scene.



Tailor first aid kits based on situations you may experience. Components generally address one or more of these:

- · Minor wounds, scrapes, burns, bug bites
- Pain or other symptom relief
- Vital medications
- Activities

Major Trauma and Critical Medical Emergencies

In this situation, contact 911 immediately. The sooner first responders are en route the faster lives can be saved. Assess the scene's safety. If for example, the vehicle is unstable because it is flipped, or in heavy traffic, do not approach. This same rule applies to emergency medical services. Law enforcement and firefighters are trained to handle these situations. Avoid becoming a victim yourself.

Minor Wounds, Scrapes, Burns, Bug bites

Stock some sterile pads, gauze tape, and medical tape to handle cuts and abrasions that can't be easily covered with an adhesive bandage. Don't forget a couple of pairs of nitrile gloves because you may be helping someone else with a persistent bleed. Include scissors (sometimes called trauma shears), which can be purchased for around \$5. Ointments disinfect or alleviate burn or bug bite pain. Hydrocortisone cream and triple antibiotic ointment are useful. Check ointment expiration dates. Sunscreen is a good addition for convertible enthusiasts.

Pain or Other Symptom Relief

Stock analgesics. Acetaminophen (e.g., Tylenol) is used for the relief of mild to moderate pain such as headache, muscle aches, minor arthritis pain, toothache as well as pain caused by colds, flu, sprains, and dysmenorrhea. Males need not be concerned with the latter. Non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs), such as Ibuprofen, reduce pain, decrease inflammation, decrease fever, and prevent blood clots. Some patients are cautioned not to use NSAIDs, so carry both. Consider other needed medications such as for motion sickness.

Vital Medications

This is often an overlooked area. If you regularly take medications during the day, or for acute situations such as angina or anaphylaxis, stock them in the kit. Of course, you'll be carrying them with you anyway, but what if you forget or lose them? Check expiration dates.


Activities

Adapt kit contents to favorite activities. Consider energy chews and seatbelt cutters for driving; fine tweezers and magnifying glass for hiking; pupil light pen and eye drops for camping; and antihistamines for allergy season.


