Thanks to all who have sent video and pictures of past events for possible use in the club videos I produce for YouTube.

Please remember that we are talking mostly about video here. Virtually all of us have a phone that has a camera that will take not only still pictures, but also excellent quality video. And I much prefer video over still pictures that really amount to nothing more than a slide show.

When involved in an event and shooting video and pictures try to think of what you are doing as a recording of that event as it unfolds. That means lots of shots of the stuff you are seeing, the cars on the road, and to a lesser extent people involved. A whole bunch of group shots minus any context on why all those folks are there really doesn't tell the story.

Video clips should be at least 10-seconds long; the longer the better. The more material you provide the easier it is for me to edit it into a completed YouTube product. Also, as you shoot the

video talk about what you are shooting. I probably won't use your narration, but it helps me identify that video clip and how it fits into the complete story I'm trying to tell in the finished video.

day. With an eye on the weather, we adapted accordingly, pivoted our plans and devised Plan B.








Some club members went

Saturday, September 20 - Apple Cider Crawl



Technical Tips



Wench With A Wrench

I have just discovered a useful gadget for long-term storage of my Miata. It's a small switch that is easily connected to your battery terminal and effectively prevents battery power-drain. In other words, you no longer must either disconnect your battery cables to the bat-

tery or remove your battery completely for long-term vehicle storage. Voila!



See detailed description below. Disconnect switches can be purchased on *Amazon.com* on-line or at your favorite auto parts store. Just make sure the height of the switch will fit under the hood of your Miata as they come in different sizes and configurations.

BATTERY DISCONNECT SWITCH (or Battery Kill Switch)

A battery disconnect switch, also known as a <u>battery kill switch</u>, allows you to manually disconnect your Miata's electrical system from the battery preventing power drain and extending battery life. These switches are useful for long-term storage, prevent battery discharge when not in use, and enhance security or safety during maintenance. They come in various types, including top post, side post, and knob-style designs, and can be controlled via a simple knob or key.

How a battery disconnect switch works:

Installation: The switch is installed on the negative terminal of your battery.

Operation: Twist a knob or turn a lever to open or close the electrical circuit.

Isolation: When the switch is in the "off" position, the <u>battery's power is completely cut off from</u> the vehicle's systems.

Types of Battery Disconnect Switches:

Top post battery disconnect switch: Connects directly to the negative terminal post of a standard top-post battery.

- Side post battery disconnect switch: Attaches to the side post of the battery.
- Knob-style/Rotary disconnect switch: A common type of switch that uses a simple twist of a knob to disconnect power.
- Key activated disconnect switch: Uses a key to control the on/off function, adding a layer
 of security.

Benefits of using a battery disconnect switch:

Extended battery life:

Prevents the battery from draining when the vehicle is not in use.

Maintenance time:

 Allows safe disconnect of the battery for maintenance without having to remove cables.

Prevents short circuits:

Helps protect the battery and electrical system from accidental short circuits.

Security and safety:

 It can be used as a security measure to prevent battery drain or even theft, and to make electrical work safer.

When to use a battery disconnect switch:

- Storing a vehicle: Ideal for vehicles (RVs and boats) that will be stored for an extended period.
- Preventing battery drain: Eliminates power draw ensuring the battery is ready when you need it.
- During maintenance: Provides a safe way to work on electrical systems as it cuts all power to the vehicle.

From Harley to Miata By Del Austin

How does one go from riding an 825 LB Harley-Davidson Dresser motorcycle to a 2023 1000 lb. Mazda Miata? Well, this is the story of how a midlife crisis started to change my life, and the life of my family. It gave me the opportunity to meet people from different parts of the world - France, Sweden, Thailand, Hobart in Tasmania, Australia - all with the same love of a curvy ROAD as me.

My love of motorcycles started in 1977. I owned a small Honda 350 and from there I went to a Suzuki 750 motorcycle. I answered an ad from a man from France who was looking for parts for his motorcycle. I knew where those parts were, and I told him I could get them for him. To keep this short, it started a friendship that has lasted for 49 years and we have traveled the world together, Virginia and me, to France and him to the United States. He was one of many Harley-Davidson Dresser enthusiasts that entered my life.

I, along with three of my Harley friends, started the International Harley-Davidson Dresser and Touring Association. We put on rallies from Titusville, FL to Saint Catherines, Ontario Canada. At one time, we also took four million dollars worth of Harley Davidsons down Pennsylvania Ave. in Washington DC, along with the twelve men that brought Harley-Davidsons back from AMF. The parade had three motorcycle Drill Teams and twenty-five HD motorcycle police leading the parade. It was a thrill of a lifetime.

But how does this get me into a Miata? It all started with two new knee replacements and eventually a new hip, and the realization that I could no longer hold up that 825 lb. motorcycle. I bought a smaller motorcycle, and it wasn't quite doing what I was looking for. One day I was out riding it and I saw three Miatas pulled into a restaurant. I rode up to those people and started talking to them about Miatas and they told me about a Miata club that was in the state of New York.

While I was in Florida on vacation during the winter for three months, I took to reading everything I could find out in any kind of magazine about Mazda Miatas, and the one thing that stuck out to me was the fact that everyone that owned one of those cars was in love with it. Like my Harley-Davidson motorcycle, it was about curvy roads, beautiful scenery, and the fellow owners. As luck would have it my first 1999 sapphire blue Anniversary edition I bought was from one of those three men, Joe Lamphere and his wife Joyce, who happened to own two that they were selling because they were buying a newer Miata.

All at once all the thrills that had been with the Harley, was now in a Miata parked in my garage. It became a joy to know these Miata Club people, to travel with these people, to put on runs for these

Flyer: You can print the <u>Club Brochure</u>; it is a trifold with Club information and an application form. There is a short form for returning members.

Registration: To help gather the list of who is attending our events, we will require members to contact the Event Coordinator directly AND copy your Area Representative. You will only need to respond if you are planning to attend, but if you need to cancel at the last minute you need to let both the Event Coordinator and Area Representative know so they do not to hold up the ride waiting for you.
