Thanks to all who have sent video and pictures of past events for possible use in the club videos I produce for YouTube.

Please remember that we are talking mostly about video here. Virtually all of us have a phone that has a camera that will take not only still pictures, but also excellent quality video. And I much prefer video over still pictures that really amount to nothing more than a slide show.

When involved in an event and shooting video and pictures try to think of what you are doing as a recording of that event as it unfolds. That means lots of shots of the stuff you are seeing, the cars on the road, and to a lesser extent people involved. A whole bunch of group shots minus any context on why all those folks are there really doesn't tell the story.

Video clips should be at least 10-seconds long; the longer the better. The more material you provide the easier it is for me to edit it into a completed YouTube product. Also, as you shoot the video talk about what you are shooting. I probably won't use your narration, but it helps me identify that video clip and how it fits into the complete story I'm trying to tell in the finished video.

This is a rain or shine event.

NATURE LOVERS BEWARE. You may find it hard to leave this place. Our excursion into Labrador's natural setting provides ample opportunity to view a variety of wildlife and vegetation that will keep you spellbound... Maybe it's too much of a stretch, but some may find it intriguing.



We will meet at Byrne Dairy, 5829 State Rte. 20 Lafayette, NY at 10:15 a.m. After a driver meeting, we will depart at 10:30 for Labrador Unique Area. Travel about seventeen minutes (10.80 miles via



CR-3 and Rt-91). We will take the accessible boardwalk to the pond and back to parking lot. This is about a 20-minute walk.

Then we will travel to Tinker Falls about five minutes away and for those who wish, hike to the falls. We will spend about 30-45 minutes there. If there are no bathrooms open, we will travel to Circle K, 5755 Rt 80 Tully, NY (15 minutes, 7 miles via Rte-80 and Rt-91) for a potty break. From there, we will travel to the Hollywood Restaurant, 27 Groton Ave Cortland, NY (15 miles, 25 minutes via Rt 11 south). Watch for a large bird's nest overhead and cows in the fields.

Reservations are at the Hollywood for 1:30 p.m. Please be advised that they normally don't do separate checks for parties over four. The Hollywood is a trip back in time, with the iconic statue of Marilyn Monroe, movie posters of Clark Gable, Humphrey Bogart, John Wayne, etc. It's a fun place to eat. Food is tasty and reasonably priced, and the wait staff is friendly. There is ample parking in their adjacent parking lot.

After lunch, around 3 p.m., we will head to Super Cream Dairy Bar, 75 N. West St. Homer, NY, for their delicious homemade ice cream. Then head home around 4 p.m. via Rt-281 and US-11 (23 minutes, 20 miles), to savor the memories of a wonderful day with wonderful Miata club friends. Please join us!



WINTER STORAGE TIPS

Hi, Miata Folks,



Below are some tried-and-true pointers I have found invaluable to keep our Miata's in good condition over the long, cold, NY winter and ready for spring reawakening. Warning: Most of you know I am obsessive-compulsive about Miata maintenance.

©

- Optional: Change the oil and filter BEFORE storage to remove acids and other waste products that can corrode your motor if you changed it in the spring. Be sure to use a good quality oil filter (I use Mobil One) with an anti-drain-back valve in it. Use a good quality motor oil too. (I now use Mobil One 100% synthetic motor oil. It's your choice to use 100% synthetic oil or real petroleum-based oil but do not mix both together. Use one or the other. (In my opinion as well as others, I think the 50/50 blend synthetic on the market is a waste of money.) (Note: If you wish to switch from "dinosaur" petroleum oil to 100% synthetic oil, just be sure to drain ALL old oil first, then add the 100% synthetic.)
- Wash, wax and thoroughly clean the interior of your car. This includes washing underneath with a hose, especially the wheel wells, to remove dirt. (Automatic car washes are not recommended.) Vacuum inside thoroughly to remove any food crumbs that entice small creatures to picnic on leftover Doritos. Critters can be unbelievably destructive not to mention their indiscriminate excretory habits. © Consider taking your removable carpets indoors for the winter to prevent becoming musty or mildew-laden. Place a couple of really stinky scented dryer sheets inside the cabin to discourage critters. Important: PLEASE <u>DO NOT</u> use mothballs; nasty naphthalene fumes are toxic to breathe.
- Check all fluid levels before storage, especially the coolant/antifreeze level. Buy a little hydrometer at an auto parts store and check the freeze point or have it checked and coolant flushed/replaced, if necessary, before winter. Old coolant can corrode the engine, cooling system and heater core.



- Fill the gas tank <u>completely</u> to prevent condensation that may contaminate your gasoline and corrode the fuel system. Some knowledgeable folks, including me, suggest <u>ethanol-free gas.</u> **IMPOR-TANT**: absolutely add <u>a gasoline storage stabilizer additive such as "Sta-bil" brand and run the engine to mix it in to prevent the gasoline from becoming "gummy" to prevent clogging injectors from sitting over time.</u>
- **Check your tire pressure**. Some suggest a slight tire <u>over-inflation</u> may prevent flat spots on your tires if you're not putting the vehicle up on jack stands. I do not store on jack stands. (More on jack stands below.)
- · Consider placing a sheet of heavy plastic polyethylene sheeting or a large piece of cardboard under the entire vehicle to prevent vapor buildup, plus it's easy to spot any fluid leaks (I hope not!).
- Remove the battery to a warm, dry place (and charge once a month, if possible) **OR** leave it in the vehicle and consider plugging in a trickle battery charger if you have access to an electrical outlet **OR**, merely disconnect the battery terminals and leave the battery in the car which is what I do because my storage space is heated to 40F 24/7. It's a popular myth that the battery will discharge if stored on a concrete floor. It won't but if you're a non-believer, set it on a piece of wood.
- · Wrap the wipers in plastic wrap to prevent the rubber from sticking to the windshield or remove completely and store indoors. I told you I was OCD.
- · **Jack Stands**: If you're considering putting your vehicle up on jack stands to prevent flat spots on your tires, don't put the jack stands under the frame as it will stress the rubber bushings in the suspension causing the suspension to "droop". Try to keep the weight as it is now... that is, put the jack stands under the outer ball joints to approximate it sitting on the ground.
- · Release the parking break. If left on, the brake pads may stick to the rotors and freeze.
- Exhaust & air intake: Remove the air filter, wrap it in aluminum foil and replace it for critter-nesting defense. Cover the end of the exhaust pipe with aluminum foil to prevent warm, fuzzy critters from nesting and causing havoc. Note: A plastic orange juice bottle top (such as Tropicana) fits snugly over the exhaust tip of NC's. Again, do not use toxic moth balls. Toxic!
- **IMPORTANT:** leave yourself a little note taped to the steering wheel to remind yourself to move the aluminum foil from the intake air filter and exhaust pipe or the car won't start and you'll be wondering why. Also, note any maintenance issues you might want to address in the spring so you don't forget, i.e., new wipers, fluid replacement, coolant flush, new tires, etc.
- **Insurance:** You might be tempted to cancel your auto insurance when your vehicle is in storage, that is to cancel completely the Collison insurance and just keep Fire and Theft only. Although that might initially save money, there is a chance that the insurance company will raise your rates due to the gap in coverage when you re-insure, which could cost you more in the long run. This can vary based on where you live and who your provider is so contact your insurance company to see what

options are available to you. Also, it's a pain in the neck to remove license plates and get new plates or store at DMV each fall and spring with accompanying paperwork, standing in line, etc. I personally keep all insurance coverage 100% while in storage.

FYI: I insure with Haggerty Insurance – it's inexpensive great coverage for older Miata's.

- · **Car Cover:** Consider a good, ventilated, <u>breathable</u> car cover to allow water vapor to leave the vehicle surface and to keep dust and dirt off the finish as well as any felines who love to sleep on convertible tops.
- · Lock the doors, give 'er a little pat on the fender and say, "See you in April."
